Florilegium, the international journal of the Canadian Society of Medievalists / Société canadienne des médiévistes, invites submissions (written in English or French) on any topic pertaining to Late Antiquity and the Middle Ages.

Submissions for an upcoming special issue on "Medieval Translation: Theory and Practice" are also invited. Papers may examine topics such as the following:

- medieval translation(s) of Latin texts into any of the medieval vernaculars
- translation(s) from one vernacular into

another

- translation and adaptation

- the politics of translation
- translation as cultural exchange

As always, submissions on other topics pertaining to Late Antiquity and the Middle Ages are also welcome. Submissions not included in the special issue will be considered for another volume.

Submissions should reach the Editor by late August 2013 or shortly thereafter. Potential contributors who expect to submit a paper later than the end of August are encouraged to contact the Editor before then.

Submissions are refereed in a double-blind review process by international specialists. Papers must not contain any self-references or other indications of authorship and must not be published or submitted elsewhere.

Manuscripts should normally not exceed 8,000-9,000 words, including notes and bibliography, and should be formatted according to Chicago style. Please keep notes as spare as possible. Papers may be written in either English or French. All submissions will be acknowledged. Please include both email and postal addresses.

Margaret Wade Labarge Prize

The Margaret Wade Labarge Prize for books published in 2011 has been awarded to Rachel Koopmans of York University for her monograph *Wonderful to Relate: Miracle Stories and Miracle Collecting in High Medieval England* (Philadelphia: University of Pennsylvania Press, 2011).

Leonard Boyle Prize

The Leonard E. Boyle prize for dissertations completed in 2012 has been awarded to Ariella Elema for her dissertation, "Trial by Battle in France and England." Stephen A. Pelle received an honourable mention for his dissertation, "Continuity and Renewal in English Homiletic Eschatology, ca. 1150-1200."
