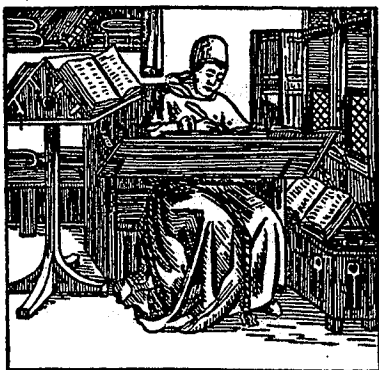

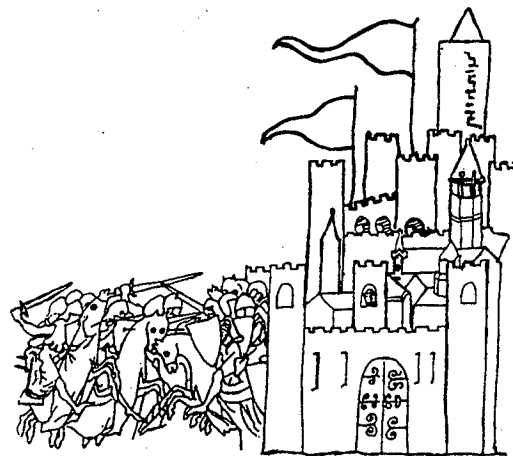
SHEILA DELANY, *English, Simon Fraser University* was on sabbatical in New York during 1997-98. Her new book **Impolitic Bodies. Poetry, Saints, and Society in Fifteenth Century England**, was published by Oxford in December and celebrated with a launch party at the National Arts Club in New York. In March she delivered the annual Russell H Robbins lecture at the New York Medieval Club, entitled "The Prioress and the Jews and the Muslims". In July she will speak on patronage by women, at the International Medieval Institute at Leeds, and on feminist criticism at the New Chaucer Society in Paris.
